Tour of the National Museum of Women in the Arts

What: Guided Tour of the National Museum of Women in the Arts **When:** Saturday, February 24 at 1:30-2:30 p.m. (revised date)

Join DCPBK for a private tour of the **National Museum of Women in the Arts**—the only museum in the world dedicated exclusively to recognizing the achievements of women in the arts. This tour will feature an overview of the contributions of 16th- through 21st-Century women artists. It will last between 45 and 60 minutes and will include coverage of museum highlights, emphasizing discovery, interpretation, and conversation about the pieces.

Logistics: Tickets (\$12) are required for the tour and will also cover the price of admission to the museum. To book your ticket, please visit PBK's <u>tour site</u>. You are encouraged to go ahead and

book your ticket as soon as possible. It's preferable that all tickets are booked at least a week in advance of the tour, but some last-minute additions can be accommodated (note that tours are non-refundable). Please also RSVP on the

Kennedy Center Visit—That was the tour that wasn't!

On Sunday, January 21, fourteen Phi Betes and their guests met to tour the **John F. Kennedy Center**, a living memorial to President Kennedy and the nation's first National Cultural Center. From its founding, the Kennedy Center has been structured as a public/private partnership: ticket sales and private and corporate donations support the artistic and educational initiatives, while the Center's building and operations costs are underwritten by Federal dollars. Unfortunately for our group, the latter detail meant that our tour was shut down, along with the government.



That didn't stop us from admiring the 630-foot-long foyer (one of the largest rooms in the world!),

puzzling over the enormous bronze bust of JFK, and soaking in the unparalleled views of DC, Arlington, and the Potomac, including the great rooftop panorama shown in the photo. Friends were made, laughs were had, and we look forward to trying the tour again sometime in the future!

Inspired by the selection, the group discussed translation of McPhee's lessons in our own daily interactions, showing the importance of remaining mindful of your audience, and how the text you choose to omit is just as important as what you include.
