<u>Speaker</u>: Frank Nicolai <u>Topic</u>: The Importance of Liberal Arts Education on the Technology Industry and the Future Generation

Frank Nicolai (PBK Bowdoin College, 1962) of Fort Washington, MD, was a co-founder of a \$1 billion global consulting and information technology firm where he served as an executive officer and director from 1970-2002. Since 2002 he has served on the boards of nonprofit organizations in the Washington area: Melwood, which serves individuals with disabilities; the Washington Home and Community Hospice; the Alice Ferguson Foundation, which provides environmental education for youth; the American Society for Cell Biology; the Committee for Economic Development; and Sagepoint Senior Living Services. For over 15 years he has been a member of the Ethics Bowl Committee of the Virginia Foundation for Independent Colleges. He earned a BA (mathematics) from Bowdoin College (1963) and a Master's in Public Administration from Cornell (1965). From 1965-1970 he was on the staff of the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Systems Analysis). Frank has been actively involved in the DC PBK mentorship network, serving as a mentor since 2017. He will be speaking about how his experience as a PBK mentor has influenced his thoughts on liberal arts education, and how liberal arts shaped the future of the technology movement.

<u>Higher Education in the Headlines: Special Event with the Phi Beta Kappa</u> <u>Society and the Association of American Colleges & Universities:</u>

On Tuesday, April 30, DCPBK members accepted a special invitation to attend a lively discussion on the topic of free speech in higher education settings, hosted by the Phi Beta Kappa Society and the Alpha Chapter of Virginia. Besides enjoying delicious food and drink, members heard from two leaders in the field, **Fred Lawrence**, Secretary and CEO of The Phi Beta Kappa Society, and **Lynn Pasquerella**, President of the Association of American Colleges & Universities. They each expounded on the importance of protecting the ideals of free speech on campus, especially in an increasingly polarized political climate. Dr. Lawrence drew parallels between our present moment and the initial founding of PBK back in 1776, a moment in history filled with uncertainty and turmoil. In the midst of revolution, a group of students staked out their commitment to the love of learning and their conviction that the pursuit of education was

anything but frivolous—even in such trying times. We appreciate the opportunity to share events with the Society, and look forward to other such events.

Book Club Reviews and News

On Tuesday, April 30, twelve members of the Book Club met at Nagomi Izakaya to discuss Early Swift's *Chesapeake Requiem: A Year with the Watermen of Vanishing Tangier Island*. This selection was one of our highest rated recently; no fewer than four out of five stars from everyone around the table. One member compared the nonfiction selection, which ponders the fate of the geography and culture of Virginia's Tangier Island in the face of erosion and water level rise in the Chesapeake Bay, to an extended *New Yorker* article due to its detail, nuance, and humanity at the core of its narrative. We debated Swift's handling of climate change, his portrayal of daily life on the island, and his rare, notable deviation from



objectivity in his recounting. We emerged with a heavy set of questions to ponder, including: what constitutes a climate change refugee, and what calculus must be at play as America is asked to confront the effects of climate change on its coasts? What makes a community valuable enough to save, history, culture, population density, natural resources? This one truly comes highly recommended by the DC PBK Book Club!

We will hold our May meeting on Wednesday, May 29th at 6:30 PM at Nagomi to discuss the classic novel *Go Tell it on the Mountain* by James Baldwin. Second Vice President

The **2nd Vice President** is an officer on the DC Area Phi Beta Kappa Association Board, and is responsible for coordinating the association's monthly programming for general membership in collaboration with event sponsors. The 2nd Vice President is NOT responsible for overseeing the programming related to the Young Professionals network, the Book Club, or the Mentorship Program.

Duties and Responsibilities include:

- Attending quarterly meetings of the DC Area PBK Board, which typically occur on Saturdays from 2:00-5:00 p.m. in the Phi Beta Kappa National Headquarters Building.
- Coordinating monthly programs for general membership. Examples include tours of museums, historic houses, government buildings, and the like; lectures, and parties. In particular, the 2nd Vice President is responsible for helping to plan the four largest events for general membership every year: Key Connections in the fall, the Annual Holiday Party in December, the Spring Fling in April, and the Annual Meeting in June.
- Marketing and promoting monthly programs, which includes collaborating with the newsletter coordinator to populate the monthly newsletter with content, with the social media coordinator to publicize events on social media channels, setting up RSVP portals and event descriptions through the website, and drafting post-event summaries for the newsletter.

- Developing budgets, managing costs, and tracking payments for programs when necessary, and helping to arrange transportation/directions when necessary.
- Other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the President.

Associate Program Coordinator

The **Associate Program Coordinator** (APC) is a newly created position to assist the 2nd VP with coordinating the association's monthly programming for general membership in collaboration with event sponsors. The 2nd VP and APC are NOT responsible for programming related to the Young Professionals Network, the Book Club, or the Mentorship Program.

Duties and Responsibilities include:

- Coordinating monthly programs for general membership. Examples include tours of museums, historic homes, and government buildings, lectures, and parties. While the 2nd Vice President will ultimately be responsible for planning the four largest events for general membership every year (Key Connections in the fall, the Annual Holiday Party in December, the Spring Fling in April, and the Annual Meeting in June), the APC may serve in a supporting role. This may include assisting with selecting venues, reaching out to potential speakers, and purchasing supplies with DCPBK funds. The APC will have the opportunity to take responsibility to coordinate other monthly events on their own.
- Marketing and promoting monthly programs, which includes collaborating with the newsletter coordinator to populate the monthly newsletter with content, with the social media coordinator to publicize events on social media channels, setting up RSVP portals and event descriptions through the website, and drafting post-event summaries for the newsletter.
- Developing budgets, managing costs, and tracking payments for programs when necessary, and helping to arrange transportation/directions when necessary.
- duties as may be assigned from time to time by the President.
- The APC will not be required to attend the quarterly meetings of the DC Area PBK Board, but are certainly welcome to. These meetings take place on Saturdays from 2:00–5:00 p.m. (or 10:00 a.m.–1:00 p.m.) in the Phi Beta Kappa National Headquarters Building.

Fundraising Committee Members
